Imagine losing everything and then having to rebuild in a new country with limited community connections, resources, and acceptance.

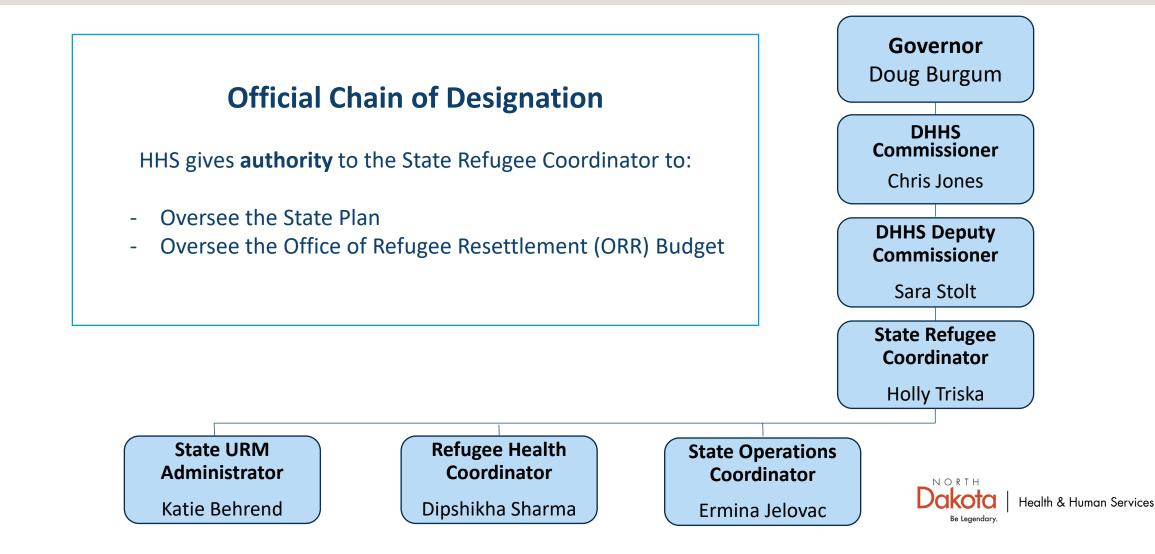
Our programs develop community collaborations to strengthen and guide newcomers as they become welcomed neighbors and valued contributors to the economy.

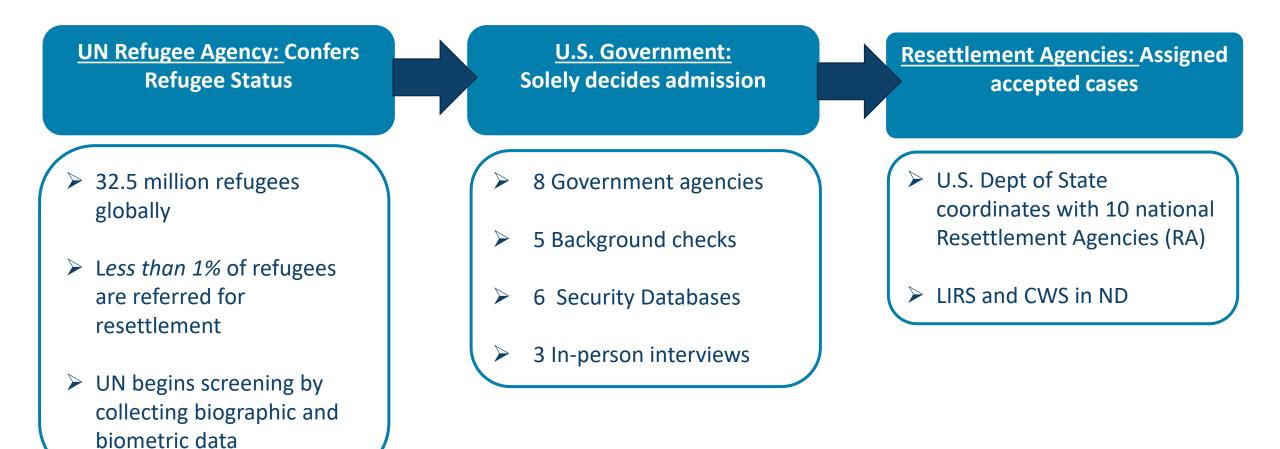

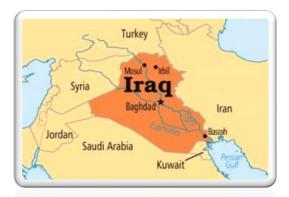


Who is a Refugee?

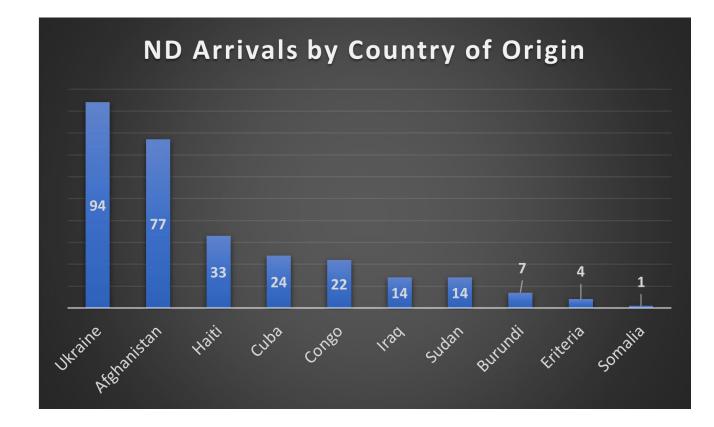

Who we serve

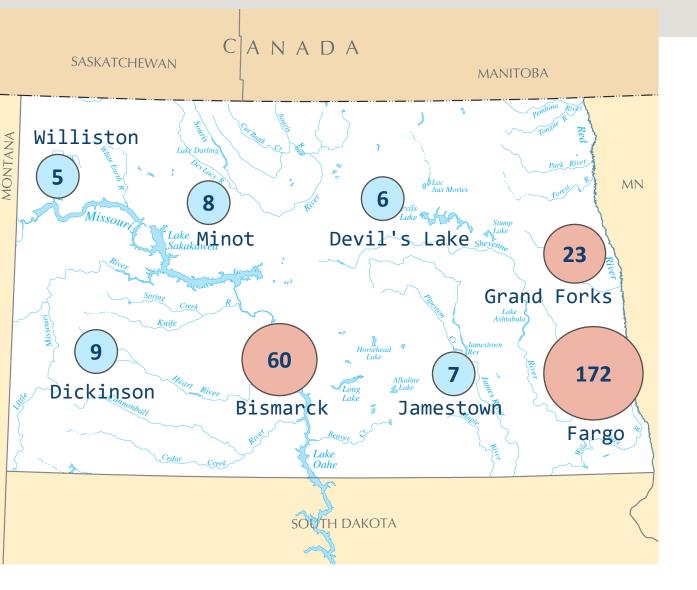
- All populations meeting Office of Refugee Resettlement eligibility criteria

Geographic Distribution of ND's Refugees



H.B. No. 1012

Resettle refugees in at least five geographically diverse communities in the state outside of the existing resettlement communities with a goal of resettling 25% of new refugees outside of existing resettlement communities.

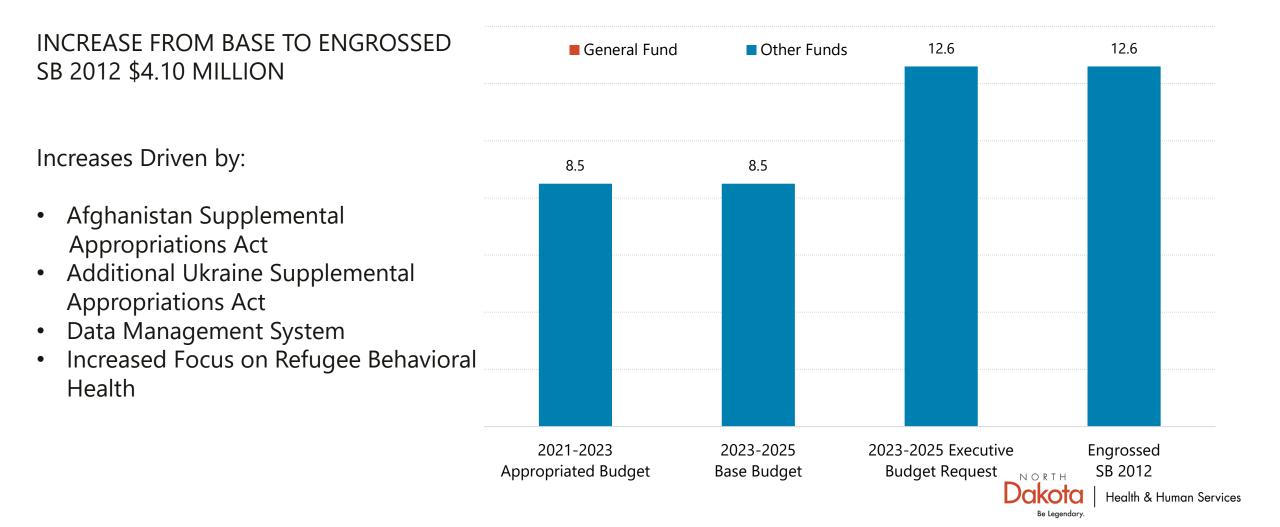

Median Annual Income

< 5 years = \$22,000 > 25 years = \$67,000

Economic Benefits Outweigh Costs

Year 1: Estimated Cost of resettlement = \$15kYear 8: Taxes paid exceed investmentYear 20: \$21k more in taxes than initial investment

40% of Fortune 500 companies founded by immigrants or their children **13%** of refugees are entrepreneurs (\$4.6B in business income annually)
